Dear Member,

It is one year this month since Wilson McComb, the then General Secretary of the M.G.C.C., came to Ulster and the Ulster Centre was formed. If my memory serves me correctly, there were about 30 people present at the meeting, made up mainly of the old M.G.T-Owner's Club which had had a somewhat chequered career until then.At that time there were about 14 members of the M.G.C.C. who were described as 'Unattached Overseas Members'. I think that we can fairly say that we have now become "attached" and are no longer considered as "Overseas". Since last July the parent Club has passed through a major crisis in that factory support was no longer forthcoming after the 'take-over' of BMH by Leylands. However, this storm was weathered and the Club has gone from strength to strength.Nearer home, the Ulster Centre has also gone from strength to strength. The first General Meeting was held on 11th. November with 14 members present.At this, a Committee was elected. Since then we have had 5 Committee Meetings, 7 Noggin 'n Natters (or should it be Noggins 'n Natter, or even Noggins 'n Natters), 2 Gymkhanas, 2 Social runs, 1.film show, and one dinner. We have been presented with 2 Trophies, and this is the fifth Newsletter. The Membership has increased to 54,40 of whom feature in the score for the Enthusiast's Trophy (see later), and finally, also detailed later, we have been recognised by the R.A.C. This is a catalogue of our achievements, and with continued participation by Members in our events, and indeed one hopes 'increased participation' coupled with a steady rise in membership, I hope that we can look forward to an enjoyable year's motoring and social activities.Would it be too much to hope for 100 members by next July? Please continue to give YOUR Club as much support as you can, because without it we will founder. What has been happening since I last wrote ? Well, I have received,

at last, a letter from a member! The suggestion was made in it that we might try to organise a race for T-types at one of the Kirkistown meetings. No approach has been made to the 500 M.R.Club so I don't know how they would react. What I would like to know, you T-type owners, how many of you would support such a venture, assuming it could be done ? Let me hear your views. I personally have my doubts as to whether there are half a dozen T-types, if that, that would pass the R.A.C.Scrutineer. It does, however, conjure some delightful thoughts. If a speed test is

wanted, a sprint may well be a simpler, and less expensive answer. I think that this may yet be premature.

Past Events.

On 10th.May we had our run to Bishopscourt for the Motor Racing. Despite a wet start at the Ivanhoe Inn,this has turned out to be our best supported venture yet,with 15 members in 11 cars.We were rewarded with a sunny afternoon and some quite exciting racing.

On Friday 30th.May, we had our Evening Social Run which was in the form of a 'Mystery Tour'. In this event we were joined by members of the Renault Owners Club.We had a turnout of 9 Renaults and 7 M.G.s (shame on you!) The run was ably organised by Bill Sherwood and Gordon dackson, and they even arranged a fine dry night for some 'hood-down stuff'. The route suggested was given at the start and one's powers of observation were put to the test before arrival at the Ivanhoe Inn via Dundonald, Scrabo, Comber and Carryduff.Members participating were, apparently in order of their power's of observation were Ian Milligan(TA) Noel Corry (TF), Mike Armstrong (TC), Alison and Ross Phinn (MGB), Margaret and Karl Murray (MGC), Mike Wilson (TF1500), and Ivan Wallace(TD). Penalties were incurred for averaging more than 20m.p.h.Entrance fees were 2/- per car, and the balance was 15/-.

On Saturday 21st, June, a gymkhana was held at Maghaberry airfield. Again, the morning was wet and discouraging, but the clouds rolled away on arrival at Maghaberry, and the sun shone throughout. The moral beingdon't be put off by the little bit of sky that you can see from the comfort of your favourite armchair. A series of 6 tests was run. Several of these were a subtle switching or combination of some of the tests in March.Test 1 involved picking a ball from each of a circle of 5 buckets and depositing it in a 6th.bucket.Reverse gear only was allowed and there was a time limit of 2 mins. In test 2, two pylons had to be placed at the estimated width of the car and then one had to reverse between these to stop as near as possible to a 3rd.pylon, using the rearview mirror only. In Test 3, driver and passenger dressed up, reversed through a wiggle-woggle, undressed, drove back thro' the pylons. Test 4 involved reversing the car so that the x off side front wheel was on a marker. The driver was blindfold and instructed by the passenger. It is very difficult to know whether or not the car is moving when you cannot see, and many an exclamation of disgust was expressed to the luckless driver sitting stationary with the clutch half depressed!Test 5 involved reversing over a line, climbing into sacks and hopping around the start line to finish by getting into the car and driving back over the start line, all in 90 seconds. The last test was an egg and spoon race(against the clock) with a wooden ladle, ax golf ball and some rough ground. R.A.C.Registration.

We have at last received recognition by the R.A.C.This will be announced in the R.A.C.Motor Sport News on 1st.July and will, barring objections, be in effect from the 1st.August1969. This means that we can run driving tests(to be called Autotests in future), rallies etc. under the regulations of the R.A.C.We shall to have the dates on which we hope to hold these meetings ratified by the R.A.C. and the N.Ireland Association of Motor Clubs.It is to be hoped that we will have an Autotest in September and in January, and a Production Car Trial in December.Because it would mean cramming all 4 Autotests into the winter months only, it has been decided not to award the Leslie Porter Trophy for 1969/70, but with a full programme of events in 1970/71 we shall by then have the experience to award this Trophy on a much sounder footing. Details will be issued later when the dates have been confifmed.

Turning one's thoughts to winter (no, it is not so far off) ideas MXXXX mooted so far include film shows; talks on organisation of motoring competitions; and on aspects of rebuilding a car; a question panel; an indoor rally; model car racing (have any of you got any Scalextric)? a dinner/dance, as well as our regular Noggin 'n Natter. Ideas for activities are welcome, and if anyone wishes to organise, or help to organise, any of them, please let me know. Remember it is your Club and we want to put on what you want, if possible. Think it over- SOON!!!
